
Plans for our two week African adventure began more than two years prior to our departure last November. For the 35 member team, it was an extraordinary experience that paired eye care service with a safari.

Our adventure got underway with a charter flight from Indianapolis to Milan, Italy. Since we weren't able to check in for a few hours, our tour company arranged a tour of that beautiful city. Monday morning we departed for Nairobi, a "short" 10 hour flight! Our hosts, District 411 Lions Clubs were at the airport to greet us. On Monday morning we went to the work site, set up and then got our clinic underway. We saw over 3,700 patients in 4 days.

It rained - Oh, my goodness, did it rain. I've never seen so much mud, but neither the rain nor the mud dampened the spirits of the team or patients.

We left the clinic on Saturday for a five-day safari including one night at the Mountain Lodge built around a watering hole. The next night was spent at the elegant Mt. Kenya Safari Club. From there we went to Kichwa Tembo, where we saw an amazing array of animals, took a hot air balloon across the Masai Mara and roughed it in tents.

We then flew from Kichwa Tembo back to Nairobi, then to Rome. Saturday morning we had time for a bus tour of Rome, ending at the Vatican where the Pope made an appearance that morn-

At a farewell party in San Pedro Sula, Honduras in February, Jeff Marshall, OD, organizer of annual eye clinics in this area for more than twenty years, presented Jim Nolan, OD, and his wife Bernice, a "Lifetime Achievement Award" for their ongoing efforts. Jeff made the presentation on behalf of both VOSH-Indiana and VOSH-Honduras.

The Indiana couple has a 30 year history of helping people in Central America. At times their efforts have been a family affair, especially a year ago when a grand sum of thirteen Nolans turned out to help in Tela and held a family reunion at the same time. It was a special week for Jim and Bernice.

Besides participating in VOSH clinics, the Nolans continually collect used eyeglasses, hospital equipment, medicine, school supplies and stuffed animals for missions. They are frequently called on to present slide shows of their missions.

Jim Nolan's motivation to help may stem from his childhood in Loogootee, Indiana where his family didn't have enough money for food or clothing. "I learned that you should never look down on anyone," says Jim.

#### Honduras 2001

The February 2001 VOSH-Indiana mission to Honduras was a resounding success. Working in the town of Pimienta for the third time a record number of team members delivered eyecare to over 4000 patients.

Our friend Ruth Berkling and her group from the Fundacion Para Servicios Medicos Voluntarios arranged for a great work site, negotiated a good rate at the hotel and in general made our stay in San Pedro Sula very comfortable. Ruth has made all the arrangements for our group since 1978.

We worked four days at the school in Pimienta. There were still a couple of teachers at the school who remembered our last visit in 1987. It was on that mission where the temperature each day soared above 115 degrees. A record not broken since then. This year a record was set when 68 people made the trip.

Our group will be returning to Honduras in February 2002 working in a village near the Mayan Ruins at Copan.

## Ambassadors for Children / VOSH Joint Mission toVietnam

September 19-28, 2002

A direct commercial flight to Saigon begins the mission. Work will be at a local hospital.

Following three days of mission work, several tentative itinerary options are offered. You can enjoy a cruise on the Saigon River and a Vietnamese music concert. Or, participants can explore the tunnel network of the VC guerrillas, visit Reunification Hall, History Museum, Notre Dame Cathedral, Chinatown and a wholesale market.

An optional excursion to Mekong Delta is offered, along with a boat trip along Mekong River to the Unicorn Island. Visit a farmer's house, enjoy southern folk music performed by villagers, and take a rowboat along the canals.

There is also an option to stay with a local family and enjoy the local culture.

Accommodations are based on double occupancy and include airport transfers, daily breakfast, four lunches and four dinners. Cost is approximately \$2500 - \$3000 and will depend upon airfare.



#### Cusco Peru Mission 2001

Bob Merriam lead a VOSH-Indiana team of 26 members to Cusco Peru, a city that offered many unique attributes to an eye mission.

Cusco is in the Andes at an elevation of 11,000 feet, and provided us with pleasant, "sweater" weather. Cusco is an ancient Inca capital and is now the "gringo" capital of South America. After work there were Incan ruins aplenty, beautiful churches, and a town steeped in history to explore. The scenery was stunning.

Four of the Lions Clubs in Cusco joined forced to host our team in the Cusco Lions "clubhouse" just 1/2 block from our hotel. "Clubhouse" is a loose term for this 200 year old massive home surrounding a large courtyard. Our dispensing room was about 40' by 30'. The large team of Lady Lions served us excellent midday dinners and light suppers. This Lions

building has ongoing clinics serving dental, eyecare and other health needs.

Our patient needs were extraordinary. At sites such as Honduras, Jamaica or the US, of all the kids screened, 10% need to see an OD. Of those, less than half need glasses. In Cusco, 56% of the kids needed glasses, and 45% needed sphere and/or cylinder correction from 1.25D up to 8.00D. These challenges were met by a special library brought by the three VOSH-Ohio participants. They supplied 1800 pair with cylinders of -1.25D or higher. (Stuff we usually throw away!) Cusco's population of 300,000 can supply an endless number of needy pa-

After noting some particularly poor "picking" on several previous missions, we took special pains to extensively train several of the pickers in a month-long correspondence course. Analysis of the Cusco "picks" showed great improvements with many startlingly close matches to many of these difficult Rxs. For the few we couldn't match, the Lions will have the glasses made.

In 4 days, with 5 OD's and 2 autorefractors, we examined 1800 patients and had the smallest amount by far of "no Rxs." Virtually everyone needed help. In the examination rooms, we had 4 OD's and one 3rd year optometry student. Two team members ran autorefractors, an OD examined the printout and wrote prescriptions directly for many of the patients. Three team members did fitting and final wash, 4 ran visual acuity lines, 2 did registration, and the last 8 held down dispensing.

This area offers wonderful sightseeing with Machu Picchu, a world-class destination, just a few hours away.

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
